However, there can be a shining light for everyone simply by lighting a candle. Every year on the second Sunday in December Compassionate Friends sponsor the TCF Worldwide Candle Lighting (WCL). Candles are lit at 7 pm in each time zone starting at the international date line and then in each following time zone effectively creating a virtual 24-hour circle of light around the globe in memory of all children that have died As we quietly gaze into the flickering light of our candle, our hearts are warmed by the memories of the times we shared with our child and the love that will live forever. Individually and collectively the candle light chases away the darkness and gloom.
