Finding Spring Again Cathy Seehuetter, TCF/St. Paul, MN

It the end isof February, which means we are nearing the end of what has often been a brutal winter. While gazing at the mountains of snow piled high in my front vard and the foot-long icicles hanging from my roof, it is hard to imagine that spring will ever come. We have endured bitter cold winds that have chilled us to the bone and treacherous roads that we have cautiously traveled. The days have been long and dark and often free of sunlight. No matter how long you have been a native of the Upper Midwest, I know we all will be glad when it comes to an end.

However, as I described these thoughts about winter, I felt as if I was describing the days of my early grief. At that point, I did not believe that a day would ever come when I would thaw from the chill that had overtaken my body and mind. The bleakness of my existence during those early months after Nina died is almost frightening to remember; it is so difficult to even conceive of that much pain. I was anesthetized from some of its cruelness by the protective blanket of numbress that blessedly shielded me from the gale force of such overpowering sorrow. How could I ever feel spring in my heart again?

Spring had always been my favorite season. The air had a certain freshness to it that I would drink in. Simply put, it always made me feel happy and light of heart. Spring was our reward for surviving the freezing winter months that preceded it. It brought a smile to my face and a bounce to my step.

However, it was the spring of the year where my heart was irretrievably broken. It was during this exquisite season of warm, lilac-scented breezes and sun-kissed mornings where my sweet daughter Nina's life would end.

wondered if Τ mv thoughts about spring would never be the same. Rather than anticipate with gladness the coming of spring, I dreaded it with the knowledge that it contained the anniversary of her death. The smell of the air and the look to the sky that I once found exhilarating now brought me back to my darkest day. I know that anyone, who has lost a loved one to death, no matter the season, understands.

Will spring come again to your life? In the almost six vears since Nina died, has it come to mine? Looking back at my description of the winter of "my early grief", I know that I have come a long way from that time of desolation. I have found, especially after the first two vears. that with each subsequent spring, I have rediscovered some of the pleasure I used to feel. I have learned that just because I have

found things to feel joyful about again; it doesn't mean I am dishonoring my daughter's memory. I now take her along with me in my mind and my Ι try heart. to retrieve memories of the dandelion bouquets she so carefully gathered and presented to me, the rides to the park in the Radio Flyer, our talks while sunning on the deck, and, of course, shopping for spring clothes! Her favorite pastime! I will always feel tenseness, apprehension and sadness as May 11th draws near, but I no longer hold it against spring.

It is a slow, difficult journey, this grief pathway we travel. It is as treacherous as the roads we maneuvered following the winter storms, never knowing when we will hit an icy patch on the road and be thrown into a tailspin. Yet, we must travel it if we are to find any measure of peace and healing.

Please be patient with yourself as you are working hard to survive this winter in your heart. Trust that spring, though a much different one than the one we knew before our beloved child died, will come again.

Plan now to attend TCF's National Conference in Arlington, Virginia July 2-4

If you've never been to a Compassionate Friends National Conference, the 2010 event, with the theme "Reflections of Love—Visions of Hope," is your opportunity. It will be held July 2-4 in Arlington, Virginia.

While details have not been finalized for this, the 33rd National Conference, here's some of what you will find: Four great keynote speakers; more than 100 workshops covering most areas of grief after a child dies; many sharing sessions; Saturday evening remembrance candle lighting; and Friday evening special entertainment by the political satire group "Capitol Steps."

Many popular features are carried over from past conferences: parent and sibling hospitality suites; reflection room; butterfly boutique, and fully stocked book store. At least a dozen memory boards will be available and placed around the hotel, so plan to bring a picture of the child you're remembering (no larger than 8"X10"). Picture buttons will be made at no charge.

There will be a complete sibling program including a visit to the popular Washington D.C. "Spy Museum." Also planned are workshops and sharing sessions for parents with no surviving children.

This year's National Conference also encompasses the eleventh annual Compassionate Friends Walk to Remember at 8 a.m. July 4th, an event designed to remember all children who have died. During the Walk, more than 10,000 names will be carried by the 1300-1500 participants and volunteers. If you wish to submit the name of a child to be carried in the Walk, you can do so online from The Compassionate Friends national website. There is no charge.

We recommend that you reserve your room as early as possible at the host hotel, the beautiful Hyatt Regency Crystal City. Online reservations can now be made through the national website. For the latest information on the conference and Walk to Remember, visit <u>www.compassionatefriends.org.</u>, click on News and Events and then TCF National Conferences.

The conference registration rate will be \$85 for adults and \$35 for siblings under 18 until late registration, which will begin June 1. Online registration will be available in March.
